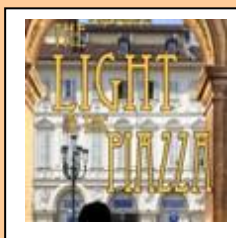

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The 98th Annual Conference of the Returned & Services League of Australia (Victoria) was held at the Melbourne Functions Centre, Caulfield Racecourse, on Tuesday July 2nd, 2013. The conference was officially opened by the Honourable Dr Denis Napthine MP, Premier of Victoria.

Victorian Branch elections for 2013/2014 were announced:

State President – D J McLachlan AO

Senior Vice President Dr R S Webster

Vice President G McL Logan

Treasurer J F Cullen OAM

A highlight for the members of the Mt Evelyn RSL Sub-branch was the presentation of the 'Meritorious Service Medal' to our past President, Andy Franks, by the State President and the Premier of Victoria. Also the 'National Certificate of Merit' with Gold Badge, was awarded to our Betty Crittenden, who was unable to attend but will be presented with her award at a time to be determined.

Membership Achievement Certificates were presented to six metropolitan and country sub-branches who had significant increases in their membership, ranging from 5% to 48%. Mt Evelyn Sub-branch membership has increased by almost 70% without mention. Perhaps we can find an appropriate time to raise this oversight.

Matters discussed included:

Collective sub-branch welfare funds to derive greater interest income and ensuring consistent auditing occurs across branches / New legislation for veterans has been passed, introducing supplements for aged care in the home / How contemporary veterans, ie: those from recent conflicts, should be recognized and included in the broader RSL / Australia's future defences and applicable conditions of service. Support for the overseas forces fund and to ensure the packages sent contained no items that could offend the country involved – donations preferred to individuals forwarding packages to serving members / The importance of overseas entertainers and how RSL funds retain this benefit long term / Commemoration of the First World War at the local level and how sub-branches can be involved with the travelling exhibition / Understanding mental health issues and how to deal with it for those affected within and outside the service / Budget provision for veterans families while the veterans are on service / Allocation of \$140 million for the Centenary of Anzac / Commonwealth funding for the restoration of the Shrine via \$1 for \$1 from the Lindsay Fox public donations. "A kilt?" exclaims Archie, "That's magic, you'll look pure smart in that. Whit's the tartan?"

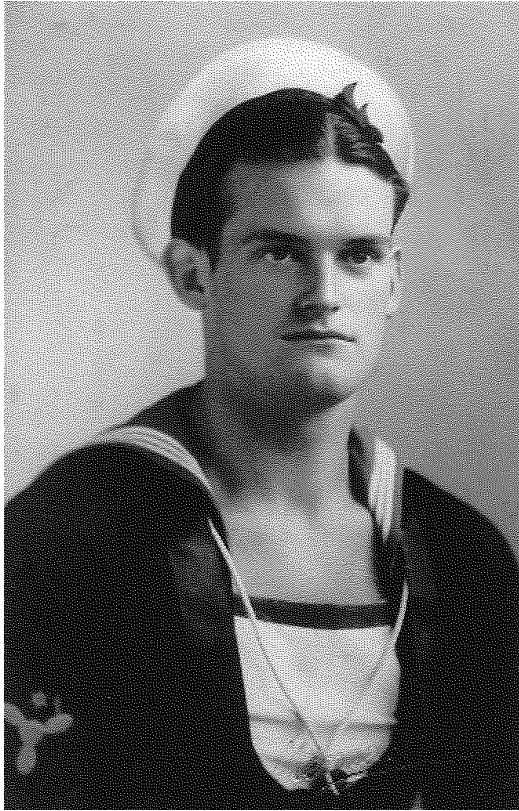
"Och," says Jimmy, "A'd imagine she'll be in white".

JACK HULL

John Cameron Hull, or Jack as he was known, was born in Lilydale and was living in Mt Evelyn when the Second World War began. In 1942, just after he turned eighteen, he was called up to serve with the Militia under the compulsory military training scheme. Allotted to the 46th Battalion he was sent with this unit to Queensland to conduct garrison duties during the period when an invasion by Japanese forces seemed a real possibility. By late 1942 his training finished and very soon after he enlisted in the Royal Australian Navy.

He undertook his initial training at HMAS Cerberus and spent quite a few months serving at the Naval bases at Moreton Island, Thursday Island and Magnetic Island. In April 1945 he was transferred to the HMAS Diamantina, a river class frigate, and during July and August 1945 Jack served with the Diamantina when it provided fire support to the Australian Army operating in Bougainville.

More importantly, when the war ended, Jack was present when the ship carried officers of the Japanese Imperial High Command to the surrender of Torokina on 8 September 1945. The ship was also involved in the surrenders of Nauru on 13 September and Ocean Island on 1 October; both ceremonies were conducted on the ship's quarterdeck. In 1946 the HMAS Diamantina was based in Sydney but undertook patrol operations in the water off New Guinea. In August 1946 the ship was put into reserve and soon after Jack was discharged from service. Today the HMAS Diamantina is on display at the 'Queensland Maritime Museum'.

In 1994 Jack's name was added to the Mt Evelyn Honour Board for being a resident who served in World War Two. Later his name was also added to the Shire Of Lillydale World War Two Honour Board that today hangs in the foyer of the Athenaeum Theatre in Lilydale.

Jack passed away on May 8th, 2013 at Wantirna aged 88 years old.

Betty first became involved with the club through her husband Bill. After Bill passed away, the club encouraged her to become a member of the Ladies Auxiliary and soon after she became treasurer. She did an excellent job in this role for quite a number of years and worked hard with fund raising for the auxiliary and often visited elderly members.

Her organisational skills were renowned; she worked hard with the team that arranged the catering for the club, it was Betty who took responsibility for buying what was required and it was Betty who took herself off to do a course in food handling and preparation so that anything the club did was up to standard.

She also regularly assisted with selling poppies and tokens outside of IGA to raise funds for welfare and on a number of occasions was responsible for organising bus trips and even several weekend trips – always great fun and always enjoyed by many.

Another important task she was involved in was that she and Betty Crittenden regularly attended METIC meetings during the period when that group were organising to create a war memorial park in Mt Evelyn.

She was a great support and a great friend to both Betty Crittenden and Dot Ervine, all of them are considered stalwarts of the club.

It's a wonderful link to Hollywood legend

MT Evelyn RSL is searching for information on its past president who had an amazing connection with Hollywood legend James Stewart.

RSL vice-president Anthony McAleer said past president Noel Anderson, a World War II veteran who died in 1991, was serving

with the RAAF in England when he came in contact with Stewart, the star of many great movies, including *It's A Wonderful Life*.

Stewart was the commanding officer of a USAAF bombing squadron nearby. Becoming friends, Stewart swapped his flying jacket for

Anderson's flying helmet. Anderson recalled: "I remember Jimmy Stewart saying 'I wish they let us wear helmets, like you blokes, because you've got your microphone and your oxygen mask and your mike all in one'.

"I had a flying helmet

made of kangaroo hide, so I swapped it for his leather jacket," Anderson said. "I've still got it hanging up in my shed in Mt Evelyn."

This then takes you to a memorial to those killed in the conflict and the long series of wall panels – each of which is made of glass and carries images from the conflict and the list of all those who served.

\$6000 GRANT TO PUBLISH BOOK

The Mt Evelyn RSL were very pleased recently to received a grant from the State Government's 'Local History Grants Program' to publish a book on the history of the 'Monash Militia Camp' at Lilydale. This is the story of how in February 1914, just before the First World War started, Sir John Monash organised a camp of instruction for the 13th Brigade at Lilydale on the site of where the Lilydale Lake is today. During their time here they also held a mock battle at Coldstream near Dame Nellie Melba's 'Coombe Cottage' that was inspected by General Sir Ian Hamilton, who was later Commanding Officer of Allied troops on Gallipoli. The RSL is confident that with this amount of funds we could expand the book to include the history of this district during World War One as well. A fitting tribute for the centenary of World War One events starting next year.

Camp uncovered

THE Mount Evelyn RSL will produce a new book about the Monash Military Camp in Lilydale after receiving a \$6000 grant recently.

The book will detail then-colonel Sir John Monash and his 13th Brigade in the lead up to World War I and will be put together by RSL secretary and historian Anthony McAleer.

The grant was provided by the State Government as part of the Local History Grants Program.

Mount Evelyn RSL president Roger Boness said it was a wonderful opportunity to document another piece of history.

"It's a fabulous outcome - we're ever so grateful to our local MP Christine Fyffe as it was through her actions that we've been able to access this grant," he said.

"We're hoping through this grant we can enhance the community and make them aware of the local history.

"Monash Camp was probably the biggest war activity in our area."

Mr McAleer said it was an important event in the history of Lilydale and the pre-war history of Victoria, as the camp was where Lilydale Lake is now.

"There were rows and rows of tents lined the area and all the soldiers arrived by train and marched through Lilydale, the town was decorated for the event," he said.

"For the week the soldiers were here they undertook field and drill training, musketry instruction and route marches around the district.

"Seven months later the First World War started and many of those who attended this camp enlisted to serve overseas."

Ms Fyffe, Evelyn MP, said she was proud to support such a worthy project.

"I think the RSL should be highly commended for ever looking at ways to retain the knowledge, the history of what our forbears did and the bravery," she said.

"It's very important for future generations to know of this and I'm looking forward to seeing the book when it's published."

GREETINGS FROM GUADALCANAL



One of our members, L/Cpl Chris McAleer, is currently on active service in the Solomon Islands as part of 'Operation Anode'. He sends this report...

Hi all! Well it is almost pack up time over here, the come home phase has started and all the jobs are done. Stability has come back to the Solomon Islands and it has been that way for a couple of years now so it is time to hand over to the local police force.

The locals are very friendly and also very thankful for the job we have done over here. I have found the children to be very friendly and more than willing to talk and play games with us as well as help us out when they can. We had a three day survival training course to do in the jungle and three children from the local village showed up. They then helped us set up a shelter and collect food as well as show us where to find it - they seemed to have more fun than we did.

Since I've been here I have also had a chance to see some of the historical battle sites from WWII. I've been to Bloody Ridge, Alligator Creek, as well as Talagi Island, where the Marines first landed. This was also the main base at the time for Japan with their sea planes operating from a small bay in that area, they then moved on to Guadalcanal. I have also, with the help of some local children, found a US underground hospital not far from Henderson Field, the main reason for all the fighting in the area.

The weather over here is great most of the time with an average temp of 35 in the day and a low of 18 at night so not too bad at all. But there is always a but! The humidity is a killer of around 65-100% some days, so it may be a shock to most of us when we get home to a cold Melbourne winter.

BILL HARRISON'S STORY – pt 2

This is the story of one of our past members, Bill Harrison. Bill served with the 1st Independent Company during World War Two and was a member of the Mt Evelyn RSL for a short time in the 1990's. In 1999 Anthony McAleer sat down with him and interviewed him about his memories of the war. What follows is Bill's story.....

Last issue: Life for Bill in the early part of the war

What was the attitude then to the Italians when they came into the war?
Once the fighting did start in the desert they were pretty much of a joke and no one ever took them seriously. If you'd seen the newspaper photographs of two Australians escorting about 7000 Italians that had been taken prisoner in the desert, that was on the front page of 'The Sun', nobody could take the Italians serious as soldiers.

Beside many of our neighbours were Italians and there wasn't any harsh feelings for them. The ones who were Australianised were all okay. I mean it's hard to resent a family that you've grown up with, kids you went to school with and shared your play lunch with and when you come home you end up spending as much time in their house as you do in your own.

When did you enlist?

October 1941, just after my twenty-first birthday, well everyone else was in it so I wanted to be. My father had re-enlisted in the army again in May 1941 and with a lot of other First World War veterans was sent to serve with a Garrison Battalion in Australia throughout the war. It was hard on my mother at home with Dad & I in the army and soon after my next younger brother Norman enlisting as well. She had to cope at home with three smaller children, two boys and a sister who was a babe in arms, very much an 'after thought'. So she was pretty much limited but I do know when things got hairy with the Japanese she moved for a time up to the cottage in Mt Evelyn as it seemed safer.

Where was your training?

I trained at Puckapunyal, in the artillery, that's where I was when the Japs came into the war.

What are your memories of hearing we were at war with Japan?

Well we thought it was a bit of a joke actually, nobody took the Japanese seriously. They said they had bad eyes and because of that they couldn't shoot straight and couldn't fly their planes properly. Today it would be like the Hottentots declaring war on us, nobody took them seriously. I mean anything made in Japan was synonymous with junk. 'Made in Japan' was an expression we used long before the war to describe absolute rubbish, poorly made toys and cheap household items and the like. 'Made in Japan' cloth probably wouldn't get past the first washing. If you bought something and the wheels fell off it two days later you'd say 'oh what do you expect, made in Japan'. This is what we believed. We regarded them as civilized savages and when they came into the war nothing happened that changed anyone's opinion, except that they were organised civilized savages.

How did you come to be in the 1st Independent Company?

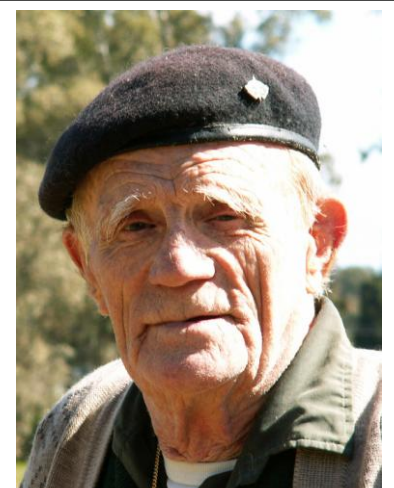
I was still at Puckapunyal and I was on a path to Malaya but that was cancelled when it was obvious the Nips were going to beat us there, they would have arrived before we did. So that draft was cancelled and the next day four mates and myself volunteered for the 'Independent Company – Commandos'. So within three days we were whizzed down to Wilson's Promontory and we did training down there.
