OUR LATEST BOOK LAUNCHED

On Sunday February 9th, 2014 a large ceremony was held at the Lillydale Lake to commemorate the centenary of a military camp for 3000 soldiers under the command of Sir John Monash that was held at the site in February 1914. (*see report inside*). As part of the Mt Evelyn RSL's contribution to this important local military commemoration, the club successfully applied for funding under the Public Records Office 'Local History Grants' to have a book published on the history of the camp. The book, written by our Secretary Anthony McAleer, details the story of the camp, how it affected this community, its importance in Australian military history and the unique and important characters involved with the camp, especially Sir John Monash who commanded the camp. It contains a fascinating foreword by one of our members, Brigadier (retired) Michael Phelps AM, and our president, Roger Boness, has written the preface.

The book was launched after the ceremony at the 'Lillydale Lake Community Room' by Michael Bennett, the great grandson of Sir John Monash. At the launch Michael praised the Mt Evelyn RSL for its efforts in producing this book and for highlighting an event that was the most important in the pre-war military career of his great grandfather.

The Militia Camp generated two additional ceremonies for the sub-branch as we worked alongside the Rotary Club of Lilydale to unveil a plaque and story board at the camp site in Lilydale and a story board sign at Coldstream, the site of a mock battle by civilian soldiers in 1914 prior to the Great War in the same year.

RSL members and friends enjoyed two outings during the year, one to the Light Horse Museum in Nar Nar Goon, stopping for lunch at Belgrave/Upwey RSL to view their military museum, and a trip to Seymour to visit the Vietnam Veteran's Walk and the Puckapunyal armoured tank museum.

Sincere thanks to our elected Federal, State and Local representatives for their ongoing support, The Mt Evelyn Bendigo Bank, our other community voluntary organisations, local schools, businesses, community members that attended our commemorative services who all contributed to the successful completion of 2013 RSL responsibilities. Finally our dedicated committee and members for their support.

Thanks must go to Sandra FitzGerald who served as Treasurer last year under tiring circumstances and to John Allwood who has stepped up this year as treasurer.



MOUNT Evelyn RSL is no longer hiring the Hardy House hall to oneoff users after two years of constant damage issues.

At the December club meeting, members voted unanimously to no longer hire the hall out after the one-off users were not following bond agreements over an 18-month period.

Mount Evelyn RSL Secretary Anthony McAleer said after a 60th birthday party toilet handles were found smashed and after an engage-ment party the RSL's wheelchair was found broken - these just two occurrences on a long list of issues.

Mr McAleer said although these groups pay bonds to cover the club in the event of damage, each time it happened it required volunteering members to do the extra work to

FAMOUS AUSTRALIAN FILM DIRECTOR GIVES OUR BOOK THE THUMBS UP!


Recently members of the Mt Evelyn RSL & the Lilydale RSL had the chance to meet up with the famous Australian film director, Simon Wincer (see right).

Poppy sales bloom for veterans

MOUNT EVELYN shopkeepers have had another record year of poppy sales in conjunction with the Mount Evelyn Returned Services League (RSL).

Mount Evelyn RSL Appeals Officer Dot Ervine said although they do not have all the trays back, the current tally looks like another record with more than \$3080 already raised.

"This is a fantastic effort seeing

that all our sales come from the one source - the Mount Evelyn community," she said.

"Thanks also to Robyn from the chemist, Jenny and Sandra who sold them at work and to our great band of workers who manned our table over those weeks."

Retail manager at Mount Evelyn Chemmart Robyn Fyander said the Red Poppy Appeal has extra special meaning to the pharmacy after pharmacists Chris Farquhar's son spent

time serving in Afghanistan.

"We care for the RSL and we really love supporting this appeal," she said.

"At Mount Evelyn Chemmart we are very community minded and I have already discussed with Dot that next year we are going to break records again.

"I'll be covered in poppies and ready to sell, sell, sell."

The Poppy Appeal runs each year in the lead up to Remembrance

Day to honour those who fell in times of war.

The Red Poppy, an emblem symbolic of those who have fallen in time of war, were among the first plants to bloom in the devastated battlefields of northern France and Belgium during World War I.

Money raised through the appeal goes directly to assist both current and former serving members of the Australian and Allied defence forces and their dependants when needed.

RIP - RALPH PROCTOR (1915-2013)

Childhood

Ralph Groube Proctor was born February 20th, 1915 in Hay, NSW.

He spent his early years growing up in Hay where he was a keen sportsman, a one stage holding the Under 16 junior high jump record for over twenty years. In his teens his family moved to a farming block in Monbulk.

When Ralph was 16 years old he moved to Queensland where he got a job as a jackaroo on a number of outback properties. He worked here for 10 years until the war started then he moved back to his parents home, who were now living in Queens Rd, Wandin.

World War Two

In 1941 he enlisted to serve in the Royal Australian Air Force, his brother Max had already enlisted the year before.

He began his training at Victor Harbour (SA) and Essendon before being sent to Canada under the 'Empire Air Training Scheme'. He completed his training in Canada and arrived in England in early 1943. After operational training here he was posted to No 295 Squadron under 'Transport Command', promoted to Flying Officer and put in charge of a crew of six.

During this period he was involved in a number of operations including flights over occupied France to drop supplies to the Marquis resistance and flights over occupied Norway to drop supplies to the resistance there. He was 'Mentioned in Despatches for Distinguished Service' for his involvement in these sorties.

His most important operation was on June 6th, 1944 when he successfully towed a glider full of British paratroopers to Normandy as part of the D-Day invasion. In September he also flew a number of dangerous missions over Arnhem in Holland to help supply the besieged Allied forces there.

He completed 28 operations in just under seventeen months.

In January 1945 he finished his tour of service and returned to Australia and was discharged from the RAAF in July 1945. His and his brother Max's names are listed on the Wandin War Memorial and on the Shire of Lillydale World War Two Honour Board.

Career post-war

Returning home to Wandin, Ralph eventually married and bought a property in McKillop Rd, Mt Evelyn and raised seven children, including two sets of twins. He turned his property into a berry and fruit farm and built their house there. He later worked around the area as a field officer for the Department of Agriculture.

Mt Evelyn Community

During his time in Mt Evelyn he contributed much to the community. He was on the Mt Evelyn Primary School Committee (in fact many of the trees around the oval were planted by Ralph), was an active member of the Silvan Fruit Growers Association, was the first male to serve on the 'Birmingham Rd Kindergarten Committee', was on the Mt Evelyn Scout Committee, was a long time member of the 'Mt Evelyn Progress Association' and was a lieutenant in the local 'Red Cross Door Knock Appeal'.

The Lilvdale Bowls Club

In 1957 Ralph joined the 'Lilydale Bowls Club' and for decades played pennant and social games with and for the club and even undertook coaching. He served as president of the club from 1978 to 1980 and was involved in all the other committees at the club. He was made a 'Life Member' of the 'Lilydale Bowls Club' in 1989.

RSL

Ralph joined the Mt Evelyn RSL in the late 1960's and has been a member ever since. For over fifty years Ralph has been a familiar sight at the sub-branches commemorative services when he wears his original World War Two RAAF officer's uniform and medals. He recently attended the Governor's Anzac Luncheon in the city where he took time to talk with the youth present on the day.

Later years

In the 1970's Ralph moved to Coldstream and then in the 1990's to a retirement village in Lilydale. During his retirement he worked as a 'Lollypop Person' in both Coldstream and Lilydale up until his 90th birthday.

Ralph has also been active in telling the story of his service to local students. He has given talks at both primary & secondary schools and has been interviewed by students for projects. Even this year, at the age of 97, he spoke to a group of students.

In 2003 Ralph donated his entire collection of wartime memorabilia, including medals and uniforms, to the 'Mont De Lancey Historical Museum' in Wandin. It serves as a permanent collection there today.

In 2004 he returned to Holland as an Australian representative for the 60th anniversary of the Arnhem campaign. In 2005 he published his autobiography – 'Aim High – Proc's Journey'.



THE MONASH CAMP CENTENARY

Last year the Rotary Club of Lilydale successfully applied for funding under the Casey 'Centenary of Anzac Grants' to put up a number of memorials in this district that recognised the centenary of the militia camp that was held in February 1914 where the Lillydale Lake is today. This was both an important local and military event and was worthy of commemorating, especially as it had a great influence on the military career of Australia's greatest soldier, Sir John Monash.

Rotary then formed an organising committee made up of community representatives to get the projects completed. Involved were: Anthony McAleer, Iain Townsley, Brigadier (retired) Michael Phelps AM & Les Kennedy (all from the Mt Evelyn RSL), Helen McDonald, Margi Sank & Ian Darvell (from the Rotary Club of Lilydale), Bob Gannaway (Healesville RSL), Don Parsons (Lilydale RSL), Graham Warren (former Mayor of the Shire of Yarra Ranges) and Blake Hadlow.

What they ended up creating was a commemorative plaque and storyboard sign at the Lillydale Lake & a story board sign out along Maroondah Hwy, Coldstream. On top of this they also organised two detailed and fascinating unveiling ceremonies.




MILITIA CAMP

LILYDALE - FEBRUARY 1914

100 years ago John Monash and 3000 citizen soldiers descended on Lilydale and camped for week where the Lillydale Lake is today.

While they were there they were visited by General Sir Ian Hamilton & Richard Williams of RAAF fame and held a huge 'mock battle' near Melba's home in Coldstream.





Why were they there, what did they do, why was the event the most important in Monash's pre-war military career?

To mark the centenary of this remarkable event the Mt Evelyn RSL has published a book that details in words and images the fascinating story of 'Monash's Militia Camp'.

BILL HARRISON'S STORY – pt 4

This is the story of one of our past members, Bill Harrison. Bill served with the 1st Independent Company during World War Two and was a member of the Mt Evelyn RSL for a short time in the 1990's. In 1999 Anthony McAleer sat down with him and interviewed him about his memories of the war. What follows is Bill's story......

Last issue: Bill makes a jungle trek to get to Wau

How long did it take you to reach Wau?

That was quite a few weeks hard slog. When we got there all of the civilians had been cleared out and all that remained were some of the 'New Guinea Volunteer Riflemen', a volunteer unit mostly made up of blokes from the First World War. We were the only unit that walked across the mountains, everyone else from 'Kanga Force' was flown in, and in fact they were the first Allied force to be flown into a battle during the war. For us it was a different story.

What was Wau like?

Wau was almost a complete island in the middle of the mountains and it existed solely for the alluvial gold. In the 1920's they discovered gold there and the 'Bulolo Gold Dredging Company', Bulolo was about seven miles from Wau and one of the main dredging fields, had set up the town and built the airstrip there. There wasn't any motor connection between Wau and the coast, only foot tracks, it had all been by plane. Between 1933 and 1935 Fokkers flew all the dredges in, all cut up, in fact everything was flown in; glass, windows, building materials and such. In the end Wau was quite a substantial town, guessing I would say there'd be about three hundred houses there, all for the Europeans, and banks and schools and so on. It was all completely installed and completely supplied by the air; Australia was so far ahead of the rest of the world when it came to the use of aeroplanes. There were however a couple hundred miles of motor roads that ran out from Wau to places like Edi Creek, which was another gold field. The airstrip was unusual though, it was on a 45 degree angle. Planes would take off down hill and land up hill. It wasn't very long but because of the slopes on it, it could handle the heaviest aircraft.

What was your role in Wau?

By the time we arrived there the Japanese had landed on the north coast at Lae and Salamaua, two main tracks that ran north from Wau and were only about a four minute flight away. The Japanese had bombed Wau several times so that a third of the houses had been destroyed, in the end all the civilians were evacuated and flown out. Once the Japs occupied Lae and Salamaua they tried to advance inland. At this point Wau only really acted as our headquarters, mainly because it had the only air strip that was opened. Our job was to go into the jungle and harass the Japanese around Lae and Salamaua.

How did you do that?

We just prowled around and kept on the move all the time. Then whenever the Japanese tried to move out of Lae or Salamaua we'd ambush them. To give you an idea, we moved around in groups of two or three and the Nips never went anywhere under two or three hundred, so we couldn't make a stand against them. But that wasn't our role; our role was to keep moving. You just fire half a dozen bursts and then away you'd go, there'd only be two or three of us but they wouldn't know that. We also had booby traps on all the tracks for any time the Jap poked his head out.
