AVENUE OF HONOUR UNVEILED

On Sunday July 26th, 2015 a large crowd braved cold weather, and later rain, to watch the unveiling of the recreated Mt Evelyn Avenue of Honour. This was a centenary of Anzac project by the Mt Evelyn History Group who received funds from the Casey electorate Centenary of Anzac programme to have 19 plaques made.

The original Avenue of Honour was planted between 1918 and 1919 at the southern end of Wray Cres and had plaques and wooden guards. For many years local state school students held ceremonies here but by the 1940's the memorial became neglected, then forgotten about and in the end dangerous, requiring the Shire to take the trees down.

When the centenary came along there was a movement to recreate the avenue. A committee was put together with representatives from MEHG, RSL, METIC & MEIPPA to decide on the form of the new avenue. Everyone felt it was the names that should be honoured, that they didn't want trees again and that it should go in the war memorial park. In the end it was decided to do a plaque that detailed the history of the Avenue and then to create 18 plaques and plinths to go around the garden that detailed the service of the 18 Mt Evelyn veterans originally honoured at the Avenue. Roger Boness and Ted Fairweather did a great job creating the plinths and the Shire of Yarra Ranges Garden Team helped install them and the main memorial.

Bill spent his last years at Mercy Health in Montrose where he was well respected by staff and popular amongst all the residents. Bill was a foundation member of the Mt Evelyn RSL and helped set up the RSL welfare account.

Luke was a popular member of the Mt Evelyn Community, RSL Sub-Branch, Mt Evelyn Football-Netball Club and the Yarra Valley Mountain District Football Netball League where he was an award winning boundary umpire.

The RSL acknowledges both Bill and Luke for their tireless contribution to the Mt Evelyn community. Rest in Peace.

On Sunday 26th July 2015 in blustery winter conditions Mt Evelyn community members, elected representatives, local school children, members of the 22nd Engineers Regiment and visitors met at the Mt Evelyn memorial garden to rededicate the names of those local World War One soldiers whose names were lost when the Mt Evelyn avenue of honour was removed due to public safety.

The Mt Evelyn Historical Society in conjunction with the RSL replaced the lost Avenue of Honour names with individual plaques set on concrete plinths in the memorial gardens. Sincere thanks to those who participated in this unique memorial service ie; 22nd Engineer catafalque party, Iain Townsley piper, Cr Maria McCarthy, Dr Bart Ziino, Combined Mt Evelyn Schools Choir, Jenny Barker, Trista Fry and Angela Glennie, Tony Smith MP, Tom Steele bugler, Rev Richard Schoenmaker and Paula Herlihy president Mt Evelyn History Group who made this bleak winters day tolerable and memorable.

The library received funding from a number of federal electorate's Centenary of Anzac funds to put the database together and project leader Kath Smalley and her team of volunteers have worked very hard over six years to get it all together.

The WWI database lists all the names on local war memorials or from the index of local military publications. These names are then put into a search engine that directs researchers back to the database for further information. A wonderful resource for family historians.

VALE BILL PHILLIPS

Bill Phillips grew up in Lilydale and enlisted in the Australian army on June 26th, 1942 at the age of only 15 years old! In order to do this he told the military authorities he was 19 and had his younger brother forge his parent's signature on the consent form. According to Bill, his Mum and Dad didn't know he'd done this. Dad was in the army himself and Mum had 10 other children to look after and thought he was working in the bush. Bill started off as a full time soldier in the CMF, training with the 31st Battalion at Yallourn where he was seconded for a time to undertake commando training around the hills of Mt Erica and Mt Baw Baw - all of this at 15! He was then transferred into the 28th Anti-Aircraft Battery and then a few months later moved to the 406 Heavy Anti-Aircraft Gun Station.

While stationed here, on May 19th, 1943, he transferred into the Second AIF and was eventually attached to the 472 Australian Heavy Anti-aircraft Troop. In September 1943 he left Sydney on a troopship bound for Townsville and the following month sailed on the SS Taroona in a convoy of 15 vessels, of which the Taroona was the flagship, to Milne Bay in New Guinea. Soon after he was moved to Oro Bay where he served until March 1944.

After this he was sent by Liberty Ship to Lae. However while here he contracted Dengue fever and dysentery and was very sick for a long time. It was during this period that the authorities discovered his real age and although 17 at the time they used his health situation to discharge him as medically unfit on June 13th, 1944.

Arriving back home to Lilydale Bill didn't slow up in the least – he decided to take up boxing. The following article appeared in the Lilydale Express in September 1944. 'Lilydale has broken into the fighting centre in the following manner as described by the 'Sporting Globe'. 'Patrons of the Melbourne Stadium on Saturday, seeing dark skinned, handsome Billy Phillips looking strange and nervous when he faced Bob Chapman in a novice bout, couldn't imagine him as a veteran of battle. Yes this 17 year old boy saw nearly two years' service with the army, more than 12 months of which he spent in New Guinea. However, after a couple of bouts of malaria someone found out his age, and he was discharged. Apparently when Billy acts his mind on anything he is hard to throw. Now it's boxing and he travels from Lilydale to Ascot Vale twice a week for training. On Saturday I heard him say he'd win or burst in the attempt. Well he won'.


His military career certainly didn't end there though. He enlisted again on July 31st, 1945, by this time he was 18 and legally able to enlist. He became an infantry instructor serving for another three years after the war ended. He undertook recruit training until he was eventually discharged in 1948 under the points system.

When the Korean War flared up in 1950, the call went out to World War Two veterans to serve in this conflict in what was to be known as 'K Force'. Again Bill signed up once more in August 1950 and was sent to Japan. However while here he was again plagued with ill health as a result of the tropical diseases he had contracted in New Guinea and ended up having to be discharged and sent home in December 1950. It should also be noted that his father Jim also served in WW2 and his son, Patrick, also went on to serve in the Vietnam War. An amazing military legacy from the Phillips family.

But an extraordinary and determined effort from a fifteen boy who showed great courage and bravery beyond his years to serve his nation in time of war and survive the horrific battlefields of New Guinea.

Bill was a foundation member of the Mt Evelyn RSL and was last year awarded a Life Membership of the RSL.

Over the years he has been a stalwart of the club.






WELL DONE TONY!

VALE – LUKE HOLLIER



MONASH'S MILITIA CAMP

LILYDALE - FEBRUARY 1914



A STRETCHER BEARER'S WAR

The Story of Ralph Goode MBE



In 1914 Ralph Goode became the first of many men from Lilydale to enlist in World War One when he joined the 2nd Field Ambulance as a stretcher-bearer. Before he left for service overseas his finncée give him two small diaries in which to write down his experience.

Over the next four years he painstakingly recorded what he went through in Egypt, on Gallipoli and throughout the Western Front. What he created on the pages of those little dinnies is an extraordinary day to day account of the horrors and beroism of serving as a stretcher bearer in what they called "The Great War".

But his life back home in those decades after the war was to be just as heroot. What he did to cope with the trauma of his war experience would benefit his community greatly and leave a lasting legacy for generations to come.

The Heroic Life of George Ingram VC, MM

From a country boyhood growing up in Seville, to serving with the artillery in Victoria and Rabaul and on to the horror and heroism of the Western Front with the 24th Battalion AIF where he was awarded both the Military Medal and the Victoria Cross.

After the war he spent time as a soldier settler before serving with the Shrine Guard and the Royal Australian Engineers in WW2.







LEONARD LAWLOR

In commemoration of the centenary of World War One, the Mt Evelyn & Lilydale RSLs have divided the local war memorials between them and will be holding a service on the centenary date of those listed on these memorials who died while on active service. In connection with this will be publishing their biographies in each of our newsletters.....

Leonard Joseph Lawlor was born at Yering on April 6th, 1894, the second youngest son of seven children to William and Sarah Lawlor. He grew up on his family farm there, helping his family on the land, and attended the Yering State School. Not long before the war started his parents moved to 'The Oaks' at Buxton and he took up work as a labourer at 'Yarra View' in Lilydale.

On September 21st, 1914 he walked into the recruiting depot at the Melbourne Town Hall and enlisted to serve in the First World War, he was twenty-one years of age. His medical record shows he was 5 feet, 7 inches high, had black hair and brown eyes. He was also a Roman Catholic.

He was sent to Broadmeadows, the AIF's training camp, where he underwent his initial training and was allotted to the 6th Battalion, regimental number 2144. In October he was visited here by dignitaries from the Shire of Lillydale and presented with a certificate of appreciation for having enlisted.

He left Australia on the first convoy, sailing on the ship HMAT Wiltshire. His mother described his farewell as such: 'I was able to see him off, my son and I went to Port Melbourne and were privileged to walk alongside him as the men marched from the station to the pier, but we were only allowed to go as far as the barrier. We bade him goodbye but were again able to see him when on the boat, after waiting patiently for three hours until they allowed the crowds through the gates on to the pier, but was unable to speak to him as he was too high up on the boat, but was able to wave until the boat moved away'.

Leonard spent a number of months garrisoned in Egypt, undergoing further training, and then they were shipped to Lemnos Island in preparation for the landing at Gallipoli.

On the morning of April 25^{th} , 1915 Private Leonard Lawlor was with the 6^{th} Battalion as they landed at Anzac Cove. He was killed in action soon after coming ashore and later that day was buried on the beach.

Because of the confusion of that morning the authorities informed his parents he was 'missing in action' rather than 'killed in action'. Not surprisingly his family lived in hope that he would turn up alive and it didn't help matters when a returned soldier, wounded on Gallipoli, claimed to have seen him in a hospital in Egypt.

In 1922 the war graves commission finally found his remains buried on the beach and informed his family, also sending back his identity disc. He was then interred in the Lone Pine Cemetery at Gallipoli. His brother Robert Lawlor was killed in action in the war also, in Belgium in 1917.

He is remembered on the Lilydale War Memorial, the Shire of Lillydale Honour Board and the Coldstream/Yering War Memorial.

His family later wrote the following tribute in The Argus:

He never shunned his country's call, But gave his young life, his best, his all.


