I would sincerely like to thank all those from the Mt Evelyn community who braved the bleak, bitterly cold conditions to attend our memorable ceremony in the memorial garden on Thursday August 16<sup>th</sup> to celebrate the illumination of the Australian National Flag (protocol regulates the display of the national flag requiring it to be illuminated if it is to be displayed at night).

Community members would also be aware of the gradual improvements being made as the memorial garden continues to be developed. In conjunction with Yarra Ranges Council it is proposed to further develop the lower or Birmingham Rd side of the garden to ensure those community members attending our commemorative services will have clear 360 degree vision and access to the proceedings.

Volunteers have been the lifeblood of the RSL since the organisation's beginnings over 90 years ago. The ongoing commitment of volunteers to the mission of the RSL has ensured veterans, war widows and other members of the ex-service community continue to receive assistance and support from people who understand and care about their history and well being. In order to fulfil this mission myself and our welfare officer, in accordance with government requirements, have undergone police record checks and will be attending relevant welfare training to ensure all RSL aged and health support needs are met.

The sub-branch's great stalwart, Betty Crittenden, has once again stepped up to the mark and has volunteered to help our secretary by taking on the role of Treasurer – many thanks Betty!

Also the RSL State Executive has now included an option for RSL funerals for the branch to present the family with an Australian National Flag in honour of their loved one. The centenary of WWI is quickly coming up and we are interested in any ideas from the members or community on how we should commemorate this.


# LAUNCH OF WAR MEMORIAL LIGHT

## **AMAZING YOUTH SHED MURAL**



Recently the president of the Mt Evelyn RSL, Roger Boness, visited the Mt Evelyn 'Youth Shed' and gave them a talk on the meaning of Anzac Day and on his experiences serving in Vietnam. The adults who run the 'Youth Shed' said his talk had a real impact on the kids that day and that they then came up with an idea to paint an 'Anzac' themed mural on the side of the shed (facing the war memorial). The mural was designed to represent a young Roger, in military uniform, with Mt Evelyn in the background. On the door is painted an Australian flag and the words 'Lest We Forget'. The mural was completed by Luke Cooksey, Conner Enright and Brad Colling. Members that have seen it have been very impressed and the sub-branch has presented the 'Youth Shed' with two special 'Kokoda' commemorative tins of Anzac biscuits in appreciation of their efforts. Well done to Mt Evelyn RSL member Ken Reed who recently celebrated an extraordinary 55 years' service with the Mt Evelyn CFA, half of which has been as Captain. As a result, at their recent annual dinner, the Mt Evelyn brigade announced that in his honour they were renaming their Pumper, the 'Ken Reed AFSM Pumper'. Ken is the first person in District 13 to receive such an honour and the Mt Evelyn pumper is now one of only four in the CFA fleet that has been officially named.

Ken has formerly been recognised with the Australian Fire Services Medal (AFSM), the National Medal and is an Honorary Life Member of both CFA and the Mt Evelyn Fire Brigade.

In January this year the new 'Worldwide Arms Museum' was opened in Vung Tau City in Vietnam. Taking part in the opening was Mt Evelyn RSL member and renowned local piper Iain Townsley, who played his bagpipes on the opening night from the museum's tower. The following day he was given special permission from the Vietnamese Government to play at the cross at the site of the former Australian battlefield at Long Tan. In a very significant gesture on this occasion officials gave him permission to wear his 'VSR' uniform and medals and to play 'The Company's Lament' for D Coy 6 RAR who fought at Long Tan.

# **DOT FLENLEY'S STORY – pt 3**

This is the story of one of our past members, Dot Flenley. Dot served with the AWAS during World War Two and was a member of the Mt Evelyn RSL. In 1992 Anthony McAleer sat down with her and interviewed her about her memories. What follows is Dot's story.....

#### Last issue:

### Dot decided to enlist

# What were your reasons for joining the 'Australian Women's Army Service'?

In those days I only had one love, and that was driving. Dad had taught me to drive when I was 14, his idea was – living in the country you never knew if it was needed for you to drive a car, in case something happened to him or Mum. I just loved driving and therefore there was only one thing I was going into, and that was the 'AWAS', and there was only one thing I wished to be, and that was a driver.

We had to go into Mildura and collect the forms at the army depot there, fill them in and send them away. Then you just waited until you were called in, have a medical and wait until you got the word you were accepted.

### Where did they send you first?

We went and did our rookie training at Darley, which to me is the coldest place in Australia, it was terrible, never ever would I want to go and live there! But apart from that it was the most wonderful six weeks, I thoroughly enjoyed it. It was adventurous, totally different to what our life was about up to then and you made many friends. Mind you the routine of army life took a little bit of getting use to, early rising and roll call before your eyes were open practically. And coming from home and straight into barracks where you slept on beds with straw mattresses and everything. But no it was wonderful. There was nothing in the army that I'd disliked to the extent that I wouldn't try it again. In fact I'd do it all over again. My sister Beryl and I were both at Darley but in different parts. We use to see each other although we shouldn't have, but we found a way in which we could. Once that was finished the girls went off to different areas, some went into Ack-Ack or into signals, they went everywhere. I applied for the driving school.

### Where were you sent after Darley?

After rookie training we were given leave for the first time and I went home. I then had to go to Melbourne to await my posting to the driving school. We were six weeks at the driving school, three weeks at Bonegilla and three weeks at Bandiana, and that was just wonderful, I really enjoyed that. We were trained on trucks and utilities, no sedans, and they use to take us out on the bitumen roads, which was good. The roads were fairly quiet, there was not a lot of traffic. Much quieter in the country, it was only when we came back to the city we had traffic to contend with. The male instructors were wonderful, they were very good to us girls, if you graded the gears they didn't scream their heads off at you or anything like that. It was mainly a matter of learning the co-ordination between your feet and your gear stick and getting it right.

That was a very happy time, it was wonderful up there. You really felt like you were doing something, you felt good in yourself. Everybody I think felt that way – helping out the country. All the girls had the same attitude to being in the army and were proud to be helping out where we didn't have the men to help out. *Next issue: Life for Dot after training*
