

J D BURNS BOOK LAUNCHED

On Sunday July 10th, 2016 members of the Mt Evelyn RSL, including president Roger Boness, attended the launch of the Lilydale RSL's latest book 'J D Burns – Poet, Schoolboy, Soldier, Martyr'. This is the biography of a young Lilydale soldier, James Drummond Burns, who was killed at Gallipoli in 1915 and was the author of the poem 'For England'. This poem moved that generation who lived through two world wars and went on to become the most widely read, well-received piece of Australian war verse ever.

The launch was held at the Lilydale Uniting Church (formerly the Presbyterian Church) in Anderson Street. J D Burns' father, the Rev Hugh McLeod Burns was once the minister at this church and it was in that building that the congregation farewelled young James for the last time before he went off to war.

Guest speakers on the day included Cr Maria McCarthy, poet Jim Brown, the Hon Tony Smith MP, president of the Lilydale RSL Don Parsons, the Rev David Kim and bugler Ian Douglas.

Also present were members of the Burns family including his niece and nephew. See order form inside for how to get a copy.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The 50th anniversary of the Battle of Long Tan will be commemorated by the Outer Eastern Melbourne Sub-Branch, Vietnam Veterans Association at the Knox, Tim Neville, arboretum in Scoresby Road on Sunday 14th August 2016 commencing at 11-00 am. Visitor parking will be available at the adjacent Fairpark Reserve. RSL members are encouraged to attend this well planned community event.

The Returned & Services League of Australia Constitution was adopted at the National Congress on 7th June 2016; similarly the RSL National By-Laws were enacted by The Board of The RSL on 7th June 2016.

In part, The Constitution establishes The Returned & Services League of Australia Limited (RSL) and The RSL is the representative national body of the League. A State Branch may, by granting charters, establish within its jurisdiction the Sub-Branches it sees necessary or desirable and make rules, not inconsistent with the Constitution or the associated By-Laws, for their governance and control. It appears the Mount Evelyn RSL quest for junior members has been successful, as under the By-Laws clause 17 Interpretation, "Other Members" these can include social, junior and community members. Mount Evelyn RSL Sub-Branch may be able now at the RSL Region Two-Forum have The Victorian Branch Inc. Branch By-Law 10B amended to also include junior membership.

The Advocacy Training and Development Programme or ATDP for short is the next evolution of the Training and Information Program, better known as TIP. The ATDP is a partnership with the Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA), Exservice Organisations (ESOs) and the Department of Defence. From July 2016, the ATDP governance structure will commence managing the delivery of advocacy training and development.

On Sunday June 12th our Piper and SAS Veteran Iain Townslev Shrine was at the of Remembrance 20 years on from the Blackhawk tragedy. On June 12^{th,} 1996, during a night exercise near Townsville, 18 men died when two Blackhawk helicopters collided in mid-air and crashed. The Special Air Service Regiment, supported by 5th Aviation Regiment, were involved in carrying out a nighttime counter-terrorism exercise in preparation for the upcoming 2000 Sydney Olympics. It was the largest peacetime loss in Australian military history. which claimed the lives of 15 SAS Operators and 3 Aviation Crew. Each year since the tragedy the SAS Association have gathered at their plaque in the Shrine Garden.

The Yarra Hills Secondary College are putting on a special play entitled 'For Home and Empire' that deals with life in Australia during the First World War.

A DIFFERENT APRIL 25th – by Max Lamb

Ask an Australian what the 25th of April is and the reply will be Anzac day, the anniversary of the 1915 landing at Gallipoli.


There was another military landing of Australian soldiers that had occurred on the 25th of April several years earlier. Coming ashore, they faced a barrage of arms. The difference between the two landings could not have been more extreme. At this earlier landing, instead of a hail of bullets, the arms that the soldiers faced were the arms of the loved ones of the Victorian 5th Mounted Riflemen. It was the 25 of April 1902. The Boer War was over and the soldiers were returning home from the war in Africa.

Australia's participation in the Boer War was from 1900 until 1902. This is the war where troops from Australia had their first 'baptism of fire', some 15 years before Gallipoli. When the first of the troops left our shores, we were still separate Colonial States. The contingents had various names such as Lances, Citizen's, Bushmen, and Mounted Riffles.

By the time they returned, we had federated and had become the Commonwealth of Australia

In total, over 16,000 men from the various States were sent to South Africa. Of these, 251 died in action or from wounds, but the biggest killer was disease, 267 succumbed to various illnesses.

The Victorian Contingents

The first three Victorian contingents consisted of a total of 751 men and 42 officers. The 4th contingent was larger; it had 598 men and 31 Officers. Then the largest contingent sent from Australia for the Boer War was raised, the 5th Victorian contingent, known as the Mounted Rifles, (5VMR). It comprised of 46 officers and 971 men. The 5VMR left Australia on 8th February 1901. It was mobilised at Pretoria on the 24 March 1901 and was mainly used to counteract the Boers that were using guerrilla tactics in warfare.

Lieutenant Leslie Cecil Maygar, (below) a member of the 5VMR was awarded the Victoria Cross for gallant acts during the Boer War. The following is the official report of the deed for which Maygar received the Victoria Cross:-

"At Geelhoutboom, 23rd November, 1901, Lieutenant Maygar galloped out and ordered the men of a detached post, which was being outflanked, to retire. The horse of one of them being shot under him, when the enemy was within 200 vards, Lieutenant Maygar dismounted and lifted him upon his own horse, which bolted into boggy ground, causing both of them to dismount. On extricating the horse, and finding that it could not carry both Lieutenant Maygar again put the man on its back, and told him to gallop for cover at once; he himself proceeding on foot. All this took place under a very heavy fire."



Four Australians of other Contingents were awarded the Victoria Cross during the course of the war

In WW1, Maygar was promoted to Captain with the 4th Light Horse. At Gallipoli, he was promoted to Major. He led the 8th Light Horse during the Sinai and Palestine campaigns. While acting Brigadier-General, he came under enemy fire from aircraft and was mortally wounded. He died the next day

In the Boer war, the 5th Victorian Mounted Rifles Contingent came into controversy after an attack by the Boers on their camp at Wilmansrust in June 1901. There were heavy casualties with 19 men killed and 41 men wounded. The British Officer in Charge of the column, Major-General Sir Stuart Brownlow Beatson, was not satisfied with the actions of the Victorian Mounted Rifles and made unfair and untrue accusations of cowardice.

When the contingent left Africa to return home, Lord Kitchener who was in charge of all allied forces sent the CO this telegram:

"11 March 1902,

Cape Town,

Please Convey to your Australians my warm appreciation of their gallant and arduous service in this country. In the name of the Army in South Africa, I wish them good luck and God speed."

Over the course of the war, Australian public support for it waned, mainly due to the British 'Scorched Earth' policy of destroying the homes and farms of Boer families.

A unique 5th Victorian Mounted Rifles Monument is located in St Kilda Road opposite Victoria Barracks that was organised by the members of the 5VMR Contingent in honour of their fallen comrades. One of the names of those that were killed in action is my Great Uncle, Henry Spencer Lamb.

There is another memorial in St Kilda Road that is in memory of all Victorians that served in the Boer War. There are plans to move this memorial to a more suitable place in the Shrine park precinct. Dotted around the State, are various memorials for those that served in the Boer War.


Right: 5th Vmr Memorial - Melbourne

A new Memorial is being planned for Canberra. It will consist of several sculptured bronze soldiers on horseback, with the largest being 150% life size. The site will be along Anzac drive leading up to the War Memorial building.

An annual memorial service for Boer War is held at the Shrine each year, usually on the last Sunday of May.


Breaker Morant, who was executed by the British for the killing of Boer prisoners, was originally from Scotland and lived in South Australia. At the out break of the war, he joined the 2nd South Australian Contingent. Later in Africa he transferred to the British unit of the Bushveldt Carabineers and promoted to Lieutenant. Lieutenant Handcock who was executed along with Morant, originally was with the NSW Mounted Riffles before joining the Bushvelt Carabineers. Lieutenant Witton whose life was spared, was with the Victorian Bushmen before joining the Carabineers.

JDBURNS

POET, SCHOOL BOY, SOLDIER, MARTYR



A week before he was due to go overseas with the 21st Battalion in 1915, nineteen year old Private James Drummond Burns of Lilydale sat down and wrote a poem entitled 'For England' for his old school magazine 'The Scotch Collegian'. It was a poem that summed up the reasons why he enlisted and would let everyone know, in an emotive way, what he saw as the important rationale for why Australia needed to be in the war.

For many the poem would express just how they felt about the conflict and about imperial identity. Notable Australian author Hal Porter claimed it 'declared with intensity, the attitude held by hundreds of other selfless young men not articulate enough to declare, except by action, their fervent beliefs'.

The poem's author had come from a family of Presbyterian ministers who had forged a strong reputation for selfless community service. James himself was a talented and impressive young man who had achieved much as a student at Scotch College and had endeared himself to all who knew him.

But when this young man with so much talent and potential was killed by a sniper's bullet in the trenches at Gallipoli, it gave his poem an added weight of importance and meaning and forced upon it a strong message of duty and sacrifice. It would go on to be published and re-published hundreds of times across Australia and the Empire and be used as a recruiting tool in two world wars.

His death would cast a dark shadow over his family and friends but to others he became the symbol of a 'school boy martyr' for a noble cause and Australia's answer to Rupert Brooke. In the end what J D Burns gave us was the most well received and widely read piece of Australian war verse to ever be written.

Iain's grandfather served on the 6th Somme with the Cameron Highlanders and in tribute to him he played a special tune 'The Battle of the Somme'. Others were also there to commemorate.


Leopold Muir



JAMES EDWARD FRASER

In commemoration of the centenary of World War One, the Mt Evelyn & Lilydale RSLs have divided the local war memorials between them and will be holding a service on the centenary date of those listed on these memorials who died while on active service. In connection with this will be publishing their biographies in each of our newsletters.....

James Edward Fraser was born on the 12th of December 1892 at Lilydale. He was the second eldest of four children to Scottish migrants, James and Polly Fraser, and he grew up on his parent's property, Yeringa (now Yering Farms), off St Hubert's Road in Yering.

He attended the Yering State School and then worked as a vigneron at the family's winery on their property. His parents were successful wine makers having taken over the vineyard first planted here in the 1880s by the Deschamp family He was also a member of the Lilydale branch of the MUIOOF and the Lilydale Presbyterian Church.

On May 24th, 1915, at the age of 23, he walked into the Victoria Barracks on St Kilda Road and enlisted to serve in the AIF. He undertook his basic training at Seymour Military Camp where he was given the regimental number 1715 and allotted to the 23rd Battalion. In July he left Melbourne on the ship HMAT Demosthenes and arrived in Egypt.

Soon after he was landed on the Gallipoli Peninsula but was only here a few days when he was struck down ill. He started having severe pains in his abdomen, so much so he couldn't walk or eat. He was soon evacuated off Gallipoli and sent to hospital back in Egypt. Here the doctors diagnosed that he had a renal stone in his kidneys and advised that he be returned back to Australia for an operation.

In mid-September he returned home on the ship 'Beltana' and arriving back on October 13th, 1915. Back in Australia he still had trouble and he could not walk around without experiencing pain. He reported to the No 5 Australian General Hospital set up in St Kilda Road, Melbourne where he was examined and booked in to have an operation. In the meantime he returned home to his parent's property and even attended a farewell function for some Coldstream volunteers heading off to war.

On November 6th, 1915, he was travelling by train from Lilydale to attend the hospital in the company of another injured soldier, Private James Sheehan, who had been wounded by shell blast on Gallipoli and had returned on the same ship as James. They got out at Flinders Street Station and proceeded to board a cable tram on St Kilda Road near Princes Bridge to take them to the hospital.

According to the 'Lilydale Express' newspaper – 'the deceased was boarding a tram in St Kilda Road towards the hospital, when a tram coming in the opposite direction caught them, Private Fraser being knocked down and badly crushed, sustaining a fractured skull and other injuries'. He was rushed to the hospital but sadly passed away that night; he was 23 years old.

The local paper lamented that 'to reach the shores of Gallipoli, to be invalided back, to pass through many dangers, and illness, and then to meet a tragic a sudden death amidst peaceful surroundings, close to his home, seems indeed a cruel and mysterious stroke of fate'.

James Fraser's body was returned back to Lilydale from the hospital on the following Monday and was buried at the Lilydale cemetery. The local paper reported it was one of the largest seen in the district for some time.
